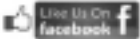

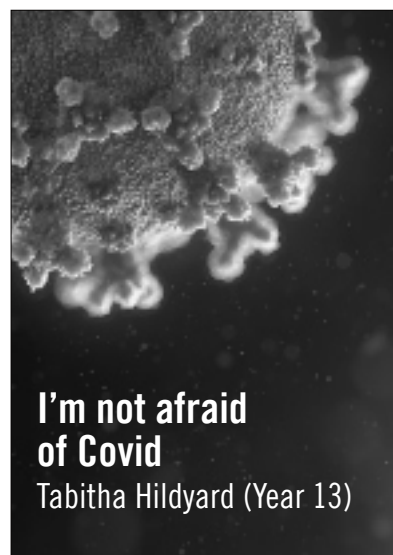

SOCIAL SCIENCES 2022

It was a busy year in the Social Science Department - lots of new Junior Social Science courses and the introduction of the Aotearoa New Zealand Histories curriculum to DHS. The three key ideas of **KNOW**, **DO** and **UNDERSTAND** are the basis for our learning in Social Sciences and we tried as much as possible to get students involved. Enjoy reading all about the highlights over the next two pages and we will see you back in 2023!

Year 9 Multicultural Aotearoa

The Year 9 compulsory Social Sciences programme introduced students to the 3 Cs we focus on - Critical Thinking, Collaboration and Communication. They studied the key aspects of culture, focussing on the Houses of Dunstan High School and then looked closely into the ANZAC culture and the NZ involvement in the Gallipoli Campaign. Next we looked at migration patterns into NZ with a focus on the different cultures and groups who have journeyed to NZ. Deborah Beange, CODC Welcoming Communities Officer, came to promote the South East Asia Festival held on 27 August and also shared her own migration experience from Texas. Students enjoyed investigating a range of groups with some focussed on their own family history. We finished with an Inquiry into the use of how social media was being used by both sides during the war in the Ukraine.



Year 10 Making of a Nation - Compulsory

As part of our compulsory course that includes learning about Human Rights, the United Nations and how government decisions make an impact on ordinary people. In 10 Mj SST students completed a Mock United Nations session. Countries were asked to decide whether or not the UN should send peacekeeping forces to Ukraine to protect humanitarian corridors and enable more medical supplies to get to places in need.



Luke Johnson - *"If the UN sends peacekeepers then they will most likely get caught in the crossfire between Russia and Ukraine. Even though I would like for someone to do something about the fighting, I don't think sending more people just to get killed and achieve nothing is a good idea."*

One of the key aspects of the Aotearoa NZ Histories curriculum is to cover essential learning that cannot be left up to chance. In the second part of our course we cover the Treaty of Waitangi and the impact this has had on the shaping of NZ as a nation. As the new curriculum is implemented, students in Year 10 will focus on current Treaty related topics such as the Waitangi Tribunal, 1975 Land March and Bastion Point but at this stage we are still required to cover the basics. For the final Inquiry, some students were able to research their own iwi histories in relation to the Treaty and focus on topics that interested them - the Northern Wars, development of Kohanga Reo and the work of the Māori Women's Welfare League.



Year 9 Money Matters

Our inaugural semester of Money Matters has been absolutely fantastic! Our focus has been on understanding the basic elements of financial capability through conceptual understanding, alongside practising these skills in real-life situations. Some highlights have included almost overwhelming New World with our flattening groups pricing their monster shopping lists (à la Two Minute Noodles), and rolling out various brands of toilet paper on the field to examine in detail which is the most cost effective (spoiler alert: Value brand was not a favourite). We have enjoyed studying the local housing market (and maintained a positive attitude in regard to our own future home-buying prospects. The students have consistently displayed their interest and excitement around understanding how to save, spend and prosper - well done, everyone!!!

Year 9 War - What is if Good For?

The students have started with a focus on wars NZ has been involved in - including the Musket Wars and the Vietnam War where they studied the Chu Chi Tunnels. The class has been enjoying creating models to communicate their understanding. It was great to have some of the students reenact this for the Year 8 Open Evening and share their learning about the tunnels with our new 2023 DHS students. The focus for Term 4 is revolutions and students are able to pick a topic they are interested in to investigate further.

Year 10 Market Day

Year 10 Market Day followed a project based learning model to find out about how to run a business. We visited "experts" such as Alexandra's own Industry Cafe to hear ex-DHS student Jen Frewen talk about her business journey. They learnt a few things such as "Owning a business is hard work." "You will never have enough money to start a business - you just have to take the risk." "People are important - staff, customers and business partners!!" We were lucky enough to have other people including Vicki McLean, Central App, Kale Panaho, K&J Growth and Paul Newsom, YES and Nic Lanham, CODC come into class to talk to us and share their knowledge. The students completed a YES (Young Enterprise Scheme) Business Sprint where they looked at addressing issues around attracting and keeping visitors in Alexandra. Groups "pitched" their ideas to the judges who gave them feedback on their ideas. The final step in the process was creating and developing their own businesses and products for a Market Day here at school.

10 NCEA History/Geography

We started the year with some geography focusing on Tititea Lodge and those lucky enough to have been on 10 Caples camp helped us to understand some of the significant places. The rest of the Houses will go in Term 4 and hopefully students will remember some of the things they learnt about glaciation..... The class listened to Alan





(Bones) Hamilton talk about his time as a student and teacher at DHS. Inspired by all these stories and the DHS archive box, the class created a florrey to commemorate the 60th anniversary of DHS. These students are currently focussed on a topic of their choice and some are attempting Level 1 standards to challenge themselves. Topics covered include the Battle of Midway, 1942, #metoo, Homelessness in NZ and the current revolution in Iran. Students are putting their Inquiry skills to the test and are working to **KNOW, UNDERSTAND** and **DO**.



Senior History

In the spirit of **DO** - the Year 11 and 13 history classes took advantage of the new 90 minute periods and went on an expedition on foot around Alexandra. We visited various historical sites with the aim of understanding what determines significance here in our town. It was an excellent outing!

When we finally could get "out of town" the Year 11, 12 and 13 History students travelled to Dunedin in July. We visited the Tōitu Museum, the Hocken Library, the Otago Museum and Olveston. Students learnt about primary source materials, how evidence is used to create exhibitions and the importance of conserving our history - **KNOW**. Olveston was very popular with the students. The house is in exactly the same state as it was when gifted to Dunedin city in 1966. Quin Richan and Hannah Tait even got to play the Steinway!!

It was great to see people who were actively using History as a part of their careers and students learnt a lot about the role of curators and archivists.

We further developed the skills of our historians by hosting Carolyn Squires from the Central Otago Oral History Project today. Carolyn came to talk to students about how she and the other volunteers gather and store oral histories.

The Year 11 and 13 History classes were lucky enough to listen in to Rosie Turnbull talk. Rosie has completed a lot of research into her Chinese heritage and this was particularly helpful as the Year 11 class are studying the impact of the Poll tax on local Chinese miners in the 1880s. All classes were incredibly privileged to have these stories shared with them to help them **UNDERSTAND** the significance of this part of our local history.



Geography and Tourism

The Geography students studied a range of local and international topics this year including the proposed airport at Tarras. In order to **UNDERSTAND** more about the issues involved the senior Geography, Tourism & Economics students were privileged to receive a visit from Rhys Boswell, of Christchurch Airport. He has a Geography, Economics and Town Planning background from Otago University and experience in planning the revitalisation of Hong Kong's 1940 - 50's designed airport into this century. He shared his perspective on plans for Tarras having an international airport. It was great for students to see someone using Geography in his professional life - **DO**.

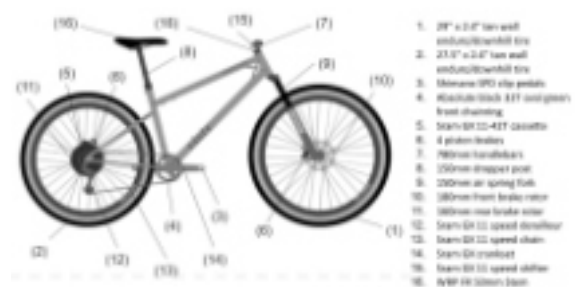
The students were interested in the rationale behind the proposal and the impact this might have on the local community. Our Year 11 and 12 Geographers went on about to use this topic as for their internal.

The Year 12 Geographers got one field trip in this year - to Queenstown in wonderful weather to complete their research standard on Alpine Zonation and Human Impact on Ben Lomond. Students were able to see the impact of Wilding pines in a unique landscape. **KNOW, UNDERSTAND** and **DO**.

Economics/FNC

This year we introduced Financial Capabilities into the Senior school with great success. Students drew up budgets, enrolled into KiwiSaver and studied various ways to fund their studies or apprenticeships in the future and what financial consequences their decisions would have. The online Banquer program helped our Juniors navigate different career options and how to draw up their Curriculum Vitae's. Mr Beck even had them measure out toilet rolls to determine value for the hard earned money when they do grocery shopping in the future.

In Economics the Year 13's studied how the value they attached to products could be used to create demand patterns for consumers and how suppliers use this information to maximise profits. They were also confronted with sectors that create products which create third party effects for society that are not even involved in consuming or producing the goods in question. They studied why Governments have to step in to reduce these social spillover costs. In Year 12 the students studied how Monetary policy could be used to combat inflation which is very relevant during the cost of living crisis experienced by many in New Zealand at this point in time. The Year 11's learnt how they have to make decisions concerning their limited resources and how their choices must provide them with the most utility while recognising the opportunities lost when they allocate resources to specific items or activities.

Project Based Learning

Students in the Year 11-13 Project Based Learning class followed their passions. Students bring an idea to the class and develop this throughout the year. We work on ideation skills and use mastermind groups to help solve problems. Students are able to gain credits towards NCEA qualification either directly related to their project OR through generic standards. Some of the highlights this year include: Eddie Adams, Year 11 who has designed his own bike. Eddie is waiting on the final mig-welding so that he can try his design out on the Alexandra terrain. Scott Horrell, Year 13 ran the DHS Junior Futsal Competition earlier in the year and spent most of his long 90min PBL periods renovating a tractor. Scott was able to flex his time at homeland school to make this happen. Jimmy Whyte, Year 11 wanted to learn to weld and managed to do this quite successfully whilst completing Technology standards. He created an e-bike stand for a client and tried out several prototypes before completing the final design. PBL is a subject that requires students to **UNDERSTAND, KNOW** and **DO**. If you have an idea, want to learn something you can't do in other classes or just want the flexibility of developing your own project - come and try out PBL.

Aotearoa Youth Declaration - Hannah Tait

Whilst so many things were canceled this year, many of our students still got involved in the extracurricular opportunities and some went "online". Hannah Tait took part in the Aotearoa Youth Declaration which was held "online". It was all about providing the youth opinion to make positive change in government areas like health (my section) and others like education. We spent a lot of time writing policy, researching and it was lots of fun. It was very cool to see the perspectives of other young people around the country.

Model European Union - Emily Attfield

In June, a group of students from Dunstan were lucky enough to attend the Model European Union at Otago University. This was an opportunity for us to develop our critical thinking, debating, negotiating and teamwork skills. It was a busy two days where we each represented a different country in the EU and represented our countries' interests. The main topic discussed was freedom of expression and information in the EU. This provided some interesting and challenging debates while allowing us to understand the mechanism behind the decision-making process in the EU.

A special congratulations to Emily Attfield who received a scholarship to study European Politics through the University of Canterbury next year as a part of their STAR course. We definitely recommend anyone with an interest in politics, debating or just wanting to try something different to keep an eye out for further opportunities next year, it is so worth it!

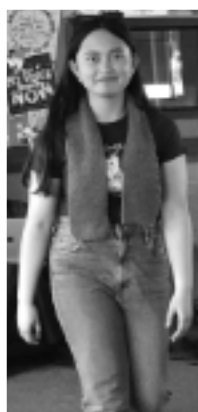

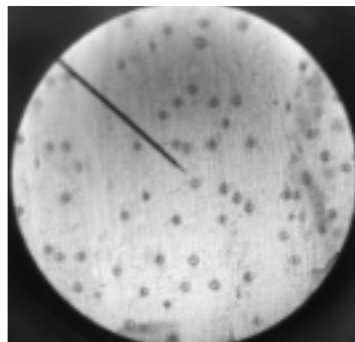


SCIENCE 2022

Year 9 Adventure based learning seized the opportunity to tramp the Sawpit gully track in Arrowtown and scale the vertical walls of Basecamp Wanaka before semester two saw students hitting the Nordic ski trails of the Snowfarm and navigating through the pines of Boot Hill.

11 Outdoor Education was jam packed with tramping, mountain biking, skiing, rock climbing with the addition of the water programme. PHYSICAL EDUCATION & HEALTH 2022

There were significant changes to the Physical Education & Health programs at Dunstan High School in 2022. This was in line with a significant shift across the junior school to a two-semester year. What has this meant for our junior programs? Prior to 2022 Year 9 & 10 PE/Health programs were a full one-year course. With the implementation of the semester concept at the junior level in 2022 the compulsory Physical Education and Health programs were reduced from complete one-year courses to one semester, (two terms). The result is some PE/Health topics could no longer be covered within the time frame. Staff teaching the PE/Health programs deliberated carefully over what aspects of the program should be retained and which parts would need to be dropped. This was by no means an easy or simple task.

The changes at the junior level also saw the introduction of six new Physical Education Option courses, three in Year 9 and three in Year 10. These courses were only one semester long and were not compulsory so students could choose to do either none, one, two, or all three of the options:-

- Y9 Adventure-Based Learning
- Y9 Practical Physical Education
- Y9 Creative Movement
- Y10 Sports Science
- Y10 Aqua
- Y10 Sport & Recreation

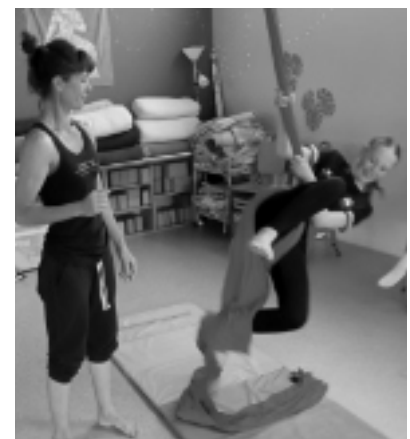
For 2023 the options have been reduced to two at each year level in order to better streamline the programs.

Two new courses were introduced at senior level, Level 2 Sport & Recreation, and Level 3 Sport & Recreation.

Both courses were combined together as one class. This catered to students looking for a less academic course and for those frequently off-site engaged in work experience and/or trades academy. Students were able to gain some unit standard credits.



NCEA courses were offered at Levels 1, 2, & 3. Across the three levels, students were able to engage in a wide variety of learning activities outside of school using a number of different community groups and facilities. This allowed students the opportunity to use facilities and tuition not available on the school site. Preparations are underway for the upcoming national changes to Level NCEA 1. There definitely is a lot of exciting change happening as we head into 2023.



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DUNSTAN HOSTEL 2022

At the start of the year, eight new Year 9 students started at the hostel, and our older students were instrumental in helping them integrate into life here. Attendances this year were very much affected by COVID from time to time, but students showed great resilience and resolve and have made the most of the opportunities they've had here. In sport, hostel students have been to the fore in a number of school teams, and have represented us with pride in rugby, soccer, hockey, cricket, volleyball, kapa haka, rowing, softball, touch, kayak polo, shooting, swimming, and school cross-country. Academically, the hostel was thoroughly well-represented at senior prizegiving merit and distinction awards, and we had an almost 100% success rate at NCEA in 2021.

Senior A

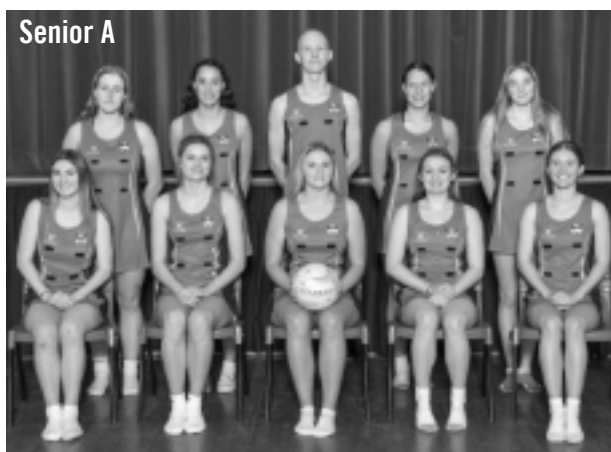

MOUNTAIN BIKING 2022

As you read this, Matangi MTB park would have just had its first birthday and gave us an early present by not having any lambing restrictions. Not many new trails to speak of this year, besides maybe the new Rockgarden down track, just a lot of tidying up of existing tracks to increase the flow. The Schools MTB racing calendar was again impacted by COVID-19, with no Souths happening, but we look forward to the Souths next year at Coronet Peak and the Nationals in Blenheim.

The first MTB event this year was the XCO race in Dunedin on the 12th of February. On a pretty wet and muddy and slippery course at Signal Hill, DHS had two students racing with very different outcomes. Cam Moir won the U15 boys race, completing two treacherous laps, beating a student from Hamilton by nearly six minutes and a local Dunedin rider. Eddie Adams had a flat tyre which caused him to crash, giving him some good cuts and grazes and a bent brake lever and was unable to finish the U17 race.

Next up was the three day Prospector MTB stage race where Eddie Adams teamed up with past student Jonathan Miller to earn a hard fought 2nd place in the U19 Junior section, only seven minutes behind the winners after seven hours of racing. The three stage race was held on Matangi MTB park and Earnsleugh Station in some typical Central Otago warm weather. The boys dropped their chains a few times, but survived unscathed and finished strongly to gain 8th place overall from nearly 60 teams.

On Thursday 24th March the inaugural Mount Aspiring College DH Champs took place at a very cold, foggy and windy Cardrona. Nine students from DHS joined students from Cromwell, Queenstown and Wanaka to race down the 'Archadia' track. Students had two hours of practice in the morning, before one timed race run in the afternoon. Grace Moir was 3rd in the senior girls and Milla Druce was also 3rd in the intermediate girls. Cam Moir was 3rd in the intermediate boys, with Jack Sole beating him by 1 second to gain 2nd place. Other students to race were Steffi Moss, Jack Sisson, Flynn Ealson, Otis Battrick and Mason Broome, some competing in a schools event for the first time. After a hard day of riding and racing most students rode the peak to pub track from the top of the mountain to the valley floor with some pretty sore hands and forearms.

At a very hot and dusty Coronet Peak, DHS had nine students compete in the Otago/Southland Champs in Downhill and Cross Country. In the DH on Saturday, Steffi Moss won the senior girls race and Hayley Harris won the U16 girls race about five

seconds ahead of her nearest competition. The boys didn't fare so well with Eddie Adams having a crash in his seeding run and taking it easy in his race run and Jack Sisson having a chilled run. Cooper Millwood was 6th in the U16 boys with Cam Moir 10th and Flynn Ealson 14th. Jack Sole had a big crash at the infamous canyon gap in his race run, unfortunately breaking his arm and putting him off his bike for several months.

Sunday was another hot day where DHS did very well in the XC races. Eddie Adams was easily the quickest racer putting in a ten minute lap to win the senior boys race and lap most of the field. Dunstan High School finished 3rd best High School in NZ, an amazing effort with only 8 students competing.

On sponsored riders news, Cooper Millwood is now a member of the Yeti Enduro Development Team so we wish him well in future events on a nice new shiny Yeti SB150 bike. He is heading to Christchurch as I write this to compete in the Phoenix Enduro at CAP. Eddie Adams is also a sponsored rider by NZ Cycling Project in the Mito Q team and recently finished 2nd in the U17 Yunca tour which is the Junior Tour of Southland as well as cleaning up in a couple of CX races.

2022 has been a bumpy road to date for me in terms of cycling, there were a number of highs along with lows.

The LOWS:

A flat tire at the wrong time resulted in a crash in Dunedin at the nationals MTB XCO series round. This meant I could not finish and was gutting as I had worked hard for this race. After recovering from this I had to refocus as the National XCO champs were just around the corner. And disaster struck again when out doing some final training rides the week before I crashed and split my knee open resulting in 6 stitches and even worse, not being able to race nationals.

My biggest setback turned out of nowhere when I crashed only a couple of weeks later at an XC race at Glendhu Bay breaking my tibia and fibula. This resulted in 2 months on crutches before starting to walk and then ride again.

These "Lows" have taught me that not every race can be the best, there will always be bad days. This has just gone and just made me more passionate and determined.

The HIGHS:

The year started off with a high when I received a phone call to ask if I would like to join the NZ Cycling Project Team as a development rider. The team consists of a number of riders from all over the country from development to elite athletes like Commonwealth Games MTB silver medallist Ben Oliver. It is a real privilege to be a part of this team and I really appreciate the support they give me to be the best I can be, I intend to work hard so that this continues into the future.

My results this year have been my best yet and a result of my consistent hard work.

National XC MTB U17 Champion at the schools national champs in Bluff.

The YUNCA junior tour of southland proved to be a great three days of road racing where I managed to push myself up to 2nd by 25 seconds after 6 races and 2nd equal on the KOM points classification.

The Novice tour of Manawatu was a two day three stage road race in the Manawatu where I managed a 2nd place in the U17 general classification and 1st in the KOM points.

The Coronet peak Goldminer MTB race was the first of the year with 2000 metres of climbing over 35km of single track, this was well suited to me and I walked away with 1st U19 and 5th overall with some big names in the mix.

The Prospector MTB Race, a 3-day 3-stage pairs XC MTB race. I teamed up with ex-Dunstan student Jono Millar to take a great 2nd place junior men and 7th overall after over 7 hours of riding.

After only a month back on the bike after recovering from injury, I rocked up to my first ever cyclocross race, the Otago champs in Mosgiel where I surprisingly managed to push myself back to my first win, winning the overall.

The Timaru two-day tour, a two-day 5-stage road tour where I ended up 3rd in the U17 A grade race.

Massive thank you to James Williamson from Willbike bike shop for being my coach and getting me to where I have been this year. I could not have done it without him. And to Caroll Goodlass who has been working with me as a sport psychologist, she is amazing and I really appreciate what she does for me.



ROWING 2022

The Dunstan High School rowers started the season off extremely well under our local club Dunstan Arm. Training began for the season in August before the cold of winter began to wear off. As it got warmer, training got earlier and we began to meet at the lake at 6 am at least 4 days a week. Regattas began in October with many of our athletes travelling to Twizel with the Otago Interprovincial team to compete against the other regions. The following day was the R2K singles regatta where our athletes put themselves out there and made us proud.

Dunstan Arm carried this success through the remaining 7 club regattas. Throughout these regattas, many of our crews finished in the top three. 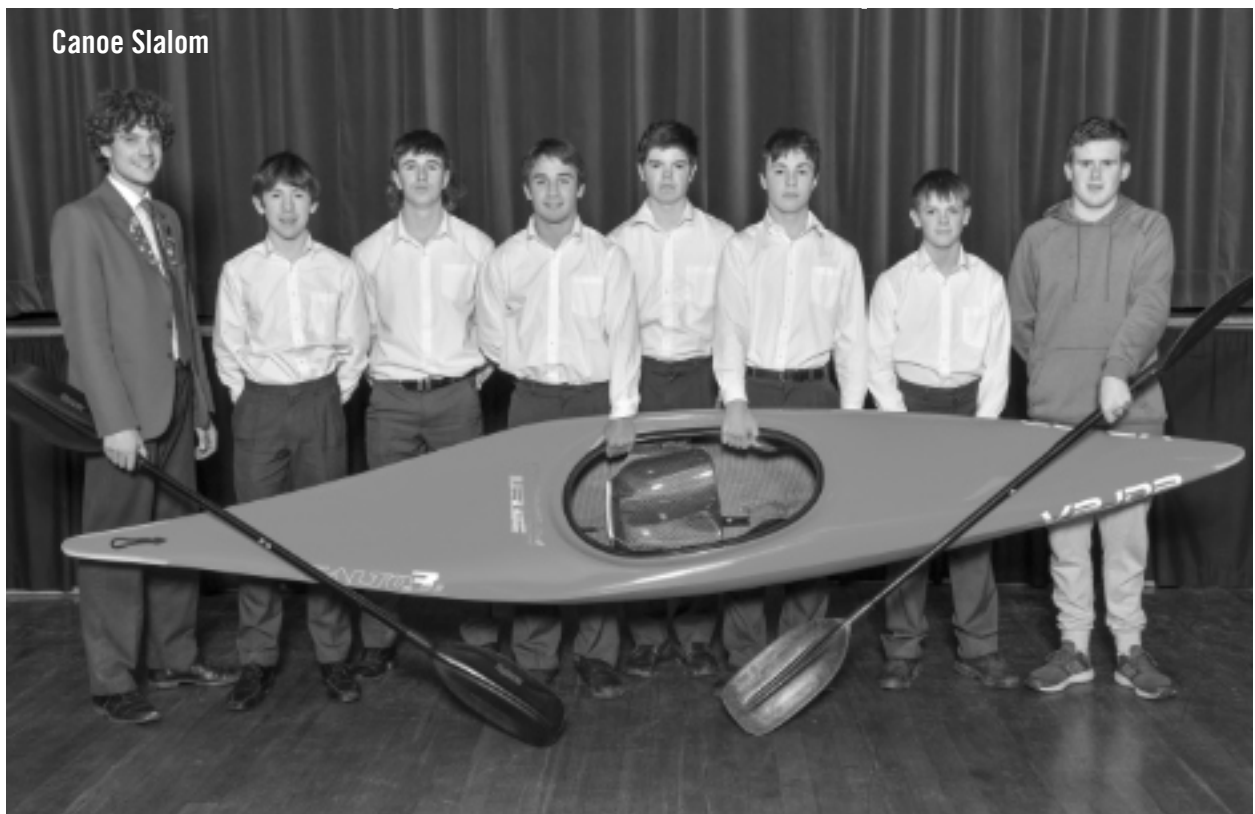

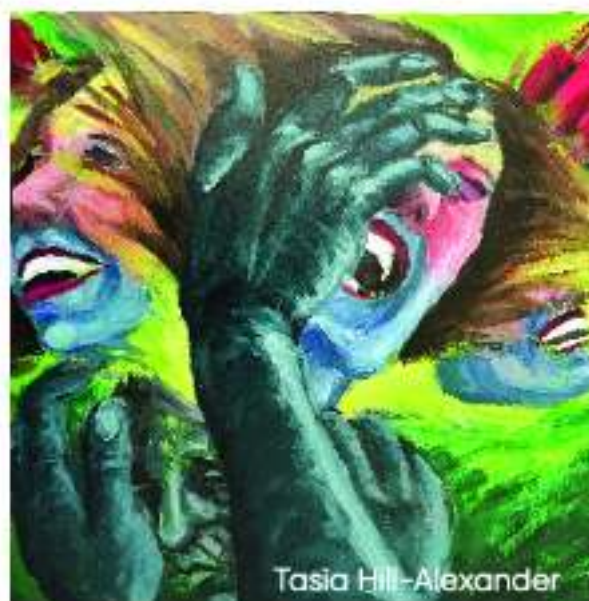
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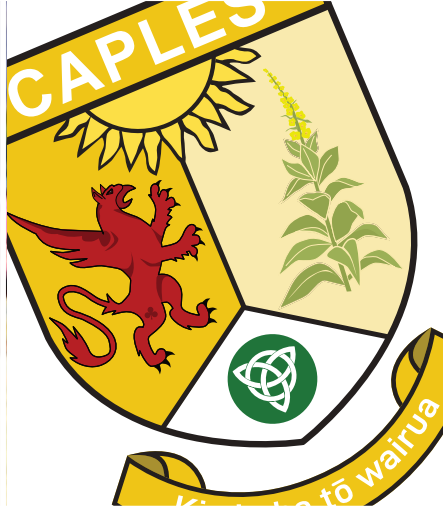








CAPLES HOUSE 2022

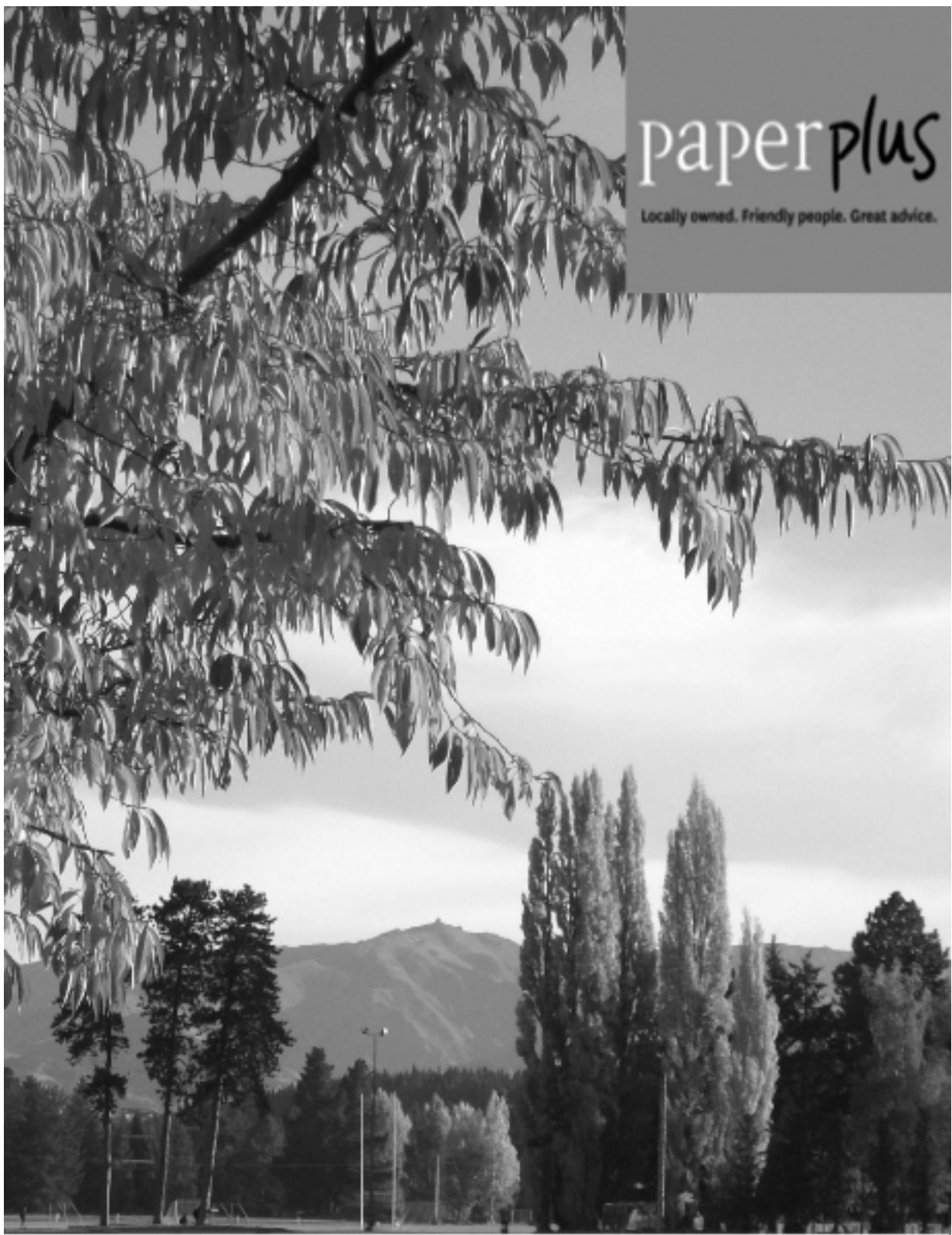
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Good Morning School

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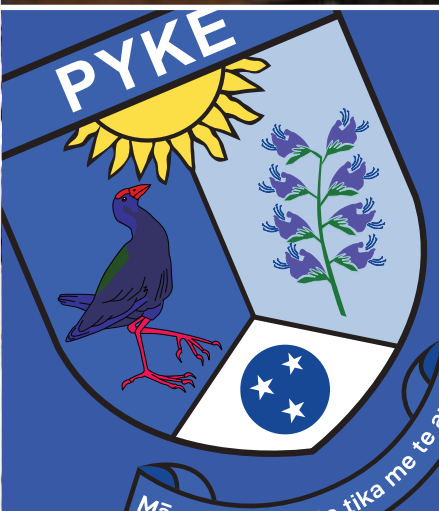
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PYKE HOUSE 2022
